WHAT DO a five-year-old karate 'king' and a 75-year-old learner weaver have in common?

At first glance the answer would seem to be nothing at all. However, there is a link - the Community Arts Project Centre.

Following the success of the Centre's first Winter School, they have had to turn away applicants this year because it was so popular and they just didn't have the space to cope.

project which is an extension of the normal activities of the Centre, which runs evening and weekend classes in subjects ranging from photography, sculpture and painting to Xhosa and karate.

Space is a limiting factor — the present building is old and the Centre is threatened with closure due to fire regulations. There is a possibility that the Project will be able to open a permanent and much-needed community centre in the near future if present negotiations to lease an unoccupied school in Observatory are successful. This proposal is receiving the sympathetic consideration of the City Council, says Mr Joubert.

Regular members who attend classes at the non-racial Based in Mowbray, it has become a greenhouse to raise Centre range from a 5 year old who takes Karate to a gentleman of 75 who attends a weaving class.
